

A common cause, an uncommon collector Bob Grissom passes on a legacy of leadership

Trying to capture a special time in life is tough, yet Bob Grissom stretches to do it as he talks about his almost 50 years in Carnival Glass.

"There's such a wide variety of people that come together for a common cause," he says, "for something that once was cheap glass.

"I don't think you could get such a variety of

people, from all across America, coming together like this."

The variety he's talking about is the Carnival Glass community that come from different backgrounds, are married or single, that all enjoy the rainbow shimmer across a glass surface. These are people who are excited at a record-breaking bid for an aqua opal cracker jar, but are just as happy for a new collector winning the bid on a first marigold, standard Ripple vase.

It's a hobby that has fed Bob's soul for so many decades. "I don't think I've found anything else as satisfying," he says.

After many years as president, Bob is staying in Carnival Glass but is stepping down from its top post. An election at the HOACGA Convention has two candidates running for the office. See page 6 for more details.

Way back, a young Bob wouldn't have imagined

such a life while he pitched hay and herded cows on his family's farm and dairy in Shawnee, Oklahoma. He was one of three boys in a life that was always busy. "Whatever came up next was my chore," he recalls.

A hitch in the United States Air Force resulted in time baking in the heat of Libya in North Africa. Wheelus Air Force Base, once a Nazi Luftwaffe base, was taken by the Allies in World War II. By the time Bob arrived, it was a large United States operation where he served in the administration building. So big a base, in fact, that regular weekend flights could take you

up to Italy for the weekend, an opportunity Bob enjoyed several times.

In 1958 Bob graduated from Oklahoma State University in Electrical Engineering, a field that led to a job with the Bendix Corporation in the Kansas City area. The focus of Bendix was as a contractor for the Atomic Energy Commission.

During this next part of life Bob and his first wife, Rosa, began raising a family of three children. Sadly, one daughter, Debbie, died at age three from a heart defect. "Today it could have been fixed," he says with regret.

Son Brian and daughter Melissa, though, have given him five grandchildren, running from young to college age. They are sometimes seen at HOACGA auctions, helping dad and grandpa enjoy the event.

A combination of events led the young couple into Carnival Glass in the late 1960s and early 1970s. First Bob and Rosa discovered that buying old things was better than new furnishings. "We started buying maybe a little bit of old furniture and I'd refinish it."

Their next interest was Tiffany-style stained glass lamps. And then came the big

pull of interest.

"The first time I remember hearing about Carnival Glass was here," he explains. "We had a neighbor lady, Dorothy Taylor, and she was into glass."

The Grissoms attended local auctions with Dorothy, who knew other people there. The more auctions you went to, the more you ran into the same people and conversations were struck up about what the old glass they were buying.

"We'd see the same people," Bob says. "About 10 or 12 people. It got to be a community of people."

Thanks to Dorothy, their mentor in glass, the community became a group. The first formal meeting was held in 1972 and included an auction by John Woody who was one of the early auctioneers specializing in Carnival Glass.

Today, according to the Amazon purchasing site, there are 15 books on Carnival Glass you can order, books ranging from price guides, to encyclopedias and histories on specific companies. Go online again and the HOACGA resource list tells you of six educational sites. Then there are at least 20 clubs worldwide, many with articles available for review. Anything and everything you want to learn about that funny-edged orange bowl

you inherited from grandma.

But that's today.

Now imagine the 1960s and 1970s when there was little information to satisfy your curiosity. No computers or sales websites. The libraries were bare of such glass books, unless, perhaps, you live in one of the glass-making states. Only a few of the glass companies are still going, so help is limited. It depended on club members to stoke each other's enthusiasm and find out answers.

While the era of making the original glass was long over, its collecting world was exploding. The clubs gathered and members shared glass and what they'd learned through their own sources, or what someone had told them.

"It was a really interesting time," Bob says. "Every time you got together you learned something different."

To satisfy the information gap, one of HOACGA's main tasks remains education. Besides the conventions, Bob helped shepherd the development of a compendium of educational publications that range in pattern and form. Each researched piece, by different club members, includes a colored photo.

The 2019 HOACGA Convention will be April 24–28, 2019, at the Embassy Suites Hotel (Kansas City Airport). Reservations may be made by calling the hotel at 816-891-7788. Room Displays: Room Displays are one of the traditional aspects of Carnival Glass conventions. They are a vital and educational part of the convention. You are encouraged to bring a room display for all of those in attendance to view and appreciate. Each Room Display will receive a Mary Ann Vase (Contemporary) by Mosser Glass. Displays winning each of the categories below will win a monetary award of \$50.00. The Display judged Best Overall and the Peoples Choice (judged by attendees) will each receive a \$150.00 award. Only one award per display. The display categories are:

- First time having a display at HOACGA
- Best Contemporary display
- Best combined Contemporary and Classic display.
- Same Maker
- Same Color
- Same Pattern
- Same Shape

Display Room: The 2019 Special Display will be **Northwood Blue** – the darker colors: cobalt, blue, Renninger and sapphire. This will be an opportunity to compare the various darker blues. There are at least

20 different variations of blue (ice blue, agua opal, Persian blue, etc) pieces. We cannot, because of space limitations, display all of the various blue variations. We did the lighter blues several years ago. The display will be set up on Thursday morning and will be available for viewing from Thursday afternoon until Friday afternoon at 4:00 p.m. Presentation of the Special Display will be by Tom Mordini on Friday morning. Tom has seen, handled, and compared more pieces of Carnival Glass than probably any other collector. So select your Northwood blue pieces of cobalt, blue, sapphire, and Renninger, including opal examples of any of these colors, that you would share. A Message from Presidential Candidate Gary Sullivan


To All HOACGA Members:

PAST HAPPENINGS — 1989

May — Paul Berube, Tiverton, Rhode Island wrote about his unique experiences when he was able to purchase a **blue** Fisherman's mug and an ice blue Poppy Show plate. The plate had been sitting in an unheated garage for more than eleven years with other pieces of glass stacked on top of it. The plate was in mint condition.

<u>Iune</u> — Marge Miller. Wife of former HOACGA president Cooley Miller, died on June 13, 1989. Marge was a very active member and she and Cooley had put together a nice carnival collection.

Ivan Mitchell died on June 26, 1989 of congestive heart failure. Ivan was always bidder #1 sitting on the front row at all auctions.

August — **Thomas Esliger** told of his recent purchase of a green **Inverted Thistle compote**. The was signed "Near Cut" which is the Cambridge Glass Company logo. This was only the second one of these compotes known.

September —The Treasurer's report showed \$12,614.59 as the fund balance as of May 31, 1989. This was decrease of \$7,763.38 for the Fiscal year 1988-1989.

Gary Lickver reported of finding two green **Peacock and Grape footed plates** at a local flea market. The same person had both of them and since Gary was willing to take both of them he would sell them both for \$60.

October — A member of the North East Carnival Glass Club's collection was stolen from his home while he was attending their convention. A total of 59 pieces were stolen.

Bob and Kitty Vining reported the death of **Jewell Bennet** of East Point, Georgia. She passed away October 3, 1989. She was an active member of the Peach State Carnival Glass Club.

John and Lucile Britt reported the death of William "Bill" **Harmon** of North Vernon, Indiana. He passed away October 18. 1989.


November — **Don Moore** wrote about the earthquake that hit the area of California where he lived. They were visiting in Iowa when the earthquake occurred. They could not reach anyone by telephone so they left by car and drove almost straight through. He said that they were very fortunate not losing more than they did. They lost a white Rustic Funeral vase, a pastel marigold **Peacock and Urn Master ice cream and 5 sauces.** Several pieces were on the floor but they were undamaged. He had consideral damage to his condominium.

December — **Dan Mahone** of Bixby, Oklahoma wrote about the **theft of 168 pieces** of his Carnival Glass. His back patio doc had been kicked in during the day.

The bulletin reported the death of **Sherman Hand**. Sherman was an active carnival collector and an author of several books about Carnival Glass.

The Woody Auction Company sold the aqua opal Poppy Show bowl at his auction on November 17, 1989 for \$18,000 This was the highest price paid for a piece of carnival at a public auction. The previous high was the aqua opal punch **\$12,000.** The bowl belonged to **Phylis Whitworth** of Oklahom: City, Oklahoma. Betty Klutts had traded the bowl to Mrs.

Whitworth for a purple Acorn Burr water set.

They are still available for purchase, either singly or compiled in a notebook.

What also means a lot to Bob is the memory of a time when a lot of adults, many in their 30s, were discovering Carnival Glass information and glass together. It also offered married couples a rare chance to enjoy a hobby together, and meet other couples like Bob and Marge, the Mochels, the Mullins and others. If the wives didn't work, they'd go out together and scoured thrift shops to find those overlooked bits of history.

Rosa Grissom passed away after many years of marriage. Bob married Imogene who, unfortunately, also died earlier. Yet, Bob's luck comes in threes. Marge, his wife of 10 years, also enjoys Carnival friendships and provides elegance with her special

table decorations.

Imogene learned that Bob's loves were the Fenton Peacock and Grapes pattern and table sets. One time Bob was chomping at the bit for an aqua opal Peacock and Grapes bowl that was up in a private sale. But the price was over what he'd usually pay. Still, that rare bowl...still, that price... and on and on. Imogene finally stopped him.

"You've been fretting about that bowl," she said to him. "You want that Peacock bowl. So why are you fidgeting around? Just go and buy it!"

Currently 75 pieces of Peacock and Grape "roost" in the Grissoms' house, along with a collection of different table sets. Bob's love of the sets was learned from the late Bob and Geneva Leonard, a

Michigan couple that was among the nationwide blanket of friends that Carnival has given him.

Traveling is one of the boons of the Grissom marriage. One trip took Bob and Rosa on a mission for HOACGA to arrange for the production of a custom HOACGA Good Luck water set. It was HOACGA's first souvenir and instead of a little plate or loving cup, the club apparently figured to go big or go home. But Bob sheepishly said they had no idea how much money it took to produce glass. At the Indiana Glass company the sales agent explained it would cost \$6,000 up front to make the pitcher and tumbler moulds. Their club, only two years old, didn't have anywhere near that money.

"That's when [club member] Ralph Mullins stepped

up and said he'd cover it," Bob says, still in wonder at the generosity.

The loan paid off, with profit. All 500 sets were sold before they were even cast.

In another travel adventure, Bob and Rosa visited Frank Fenton in West Virginia. Over time Frank, of Fenton Art Glass, became a sort of patron saint to Carnival Glass collectors. He shared his time and knowledge where he could, exciting people because he linked the glass past to their collecting present.

"Frank was one of the best things Carnival had going for it," Bob says.

Meanwhile, Bob and Frank became friends. During that visit Frank surprised the Grissoms. He'd been a

widower for many years and liked their company.

"Well," Bob lets go with one of his chuckles. "In the morning Frank said 'I think there are some eggs in the refrigerator here.' Well, the eggs in there were solid they were so old."

They went out for breakfast.

Bob served as president early in its formation and then took on the roll for 38 years. Through it he lead the club through growth and changes to meet the needs of members in convention experience and helping the glass passion grow.

Organizing the convention is a challenge, says Bob, but the actual convention is fun for him. About a dozen volunteers help during the event, along with a small crowd of other volunteers who help set up the big display.

There were a few who thought that Bob *was* the HOACGA Club

and once he retired, the club would fold as others had. Instead, this club has two strong candidates for president, a sign of vitality for one of the largest such glass conventions in the country.

Bob says he knows whoever follows after him will have the same feeling he's experienced over time.

"There's a challenge of things that can be done, that need to be done for education," he says. And, of course, there are those people, all tied to a common cause that creates a rare friendship.

"There's a willingness and eagerness of people to come to visit and learn. They're here for a good time, to learn and to be with people you know."
