
President's Corner By Emmett Morgan


(On the Hunt with Corky)

Kneeling Down By Corky Cotten

How many times have you been in a shop and forgot to look up or kneel down? If you are like me, with old age bones, kneeling down can be an ordeal and even more of an ordeal trying to get back up.

Around six years back I found four shops in a small town I had never visited before. I spent about 30 minutes in an old house converted to a shop, and all I spotted were three very

common pieces... not very interesting. They were all in the same area belonging to the same vendor.



To my surprise and delight I am holding an extremely dirty amethyst Millersburg Whirling Leaves tri -corner crimped-edge bowl. The price could not be beat which made me suspect either it had been there for decades, or something was wrong with it. After a minor cleaning with my shirt tail and a little spittle, 10-15 minutes of inspection revealed no damage.

As it often happens when hunting, I find myself getting complacent and not looking in the hard to see areas. Maybe you are this way also? Who wants to kneel down unless they have to? However, it is worth the effort as occasionally you might find that piece that puts a smile on your face.

So don't forget to look high and low and to the backside of all shelves while hunting.



Pattern Names by Kathi Johnson

This is just a cute little story with a logical twist.

Just for fun and entertainment we occasionally browse Facebook Marketplace (a selling platform – think like garage sale). I say entertainment, because the people selling glass on here are usually just cleaning out a box they found that Grandma or Mom left, so the seller's knowledge is usually minimal or non-existent.

Not too long ago I was searching for Carnival (which brings up a multitude of things, most of them NOT Carnival Glass or, if they are, usually '60s

Revival Carnival Glass). There was a very nice necklace made from a marigold piece of Carnival Glass!



I'm guessing it was made from a broken bowl or tumbler. The seller was in Michigan (not too far away, but definitely not close). The listing read "Vintage Iridescent Glass Palm Tree Necklace," and the description read "Vintage iridescent carnival glass oval necklace with a potted palm plant." (Circa 70s).

I was happy with the price they were asking, and I knew that it was made from the Peacock at the Fountain pattern. So, I messaged the seller, asking if she would sell just the necklace and not the potted palm plant (can't imagine what shipping would cost for that!).

She came back with "there isn't a plant included – I'm confused on that." And that's when I read the listing again <u>AND</u> looked at the picture – and realized that the portion of the pattern included in the necklace looks just like a 'potted palm.' Or it certainly would to someone who wasn't familiar with the Peacock at the Fountain pattern (or the actual era for the pattern)!

I completed the transaction, received

it, and am very, very happy with my 'Peacock at the Fountain aka Potted Palm' necklace.

Broken Arches by Imperial






An Imperial pattern that is found on the exterior of punch bowls, bases and matching punch cups. The pattern is easy to remember because the arches are divided into small sections much like stones in an arched doorway. Known only in marigold and purple. Most tops are round like the one on the left but a few are ruffled. The tops come with one of four interiors; either a blank unpatterned interior or with one of three unique interior patterns:

- 1) To the right is an example of a blank interior
- 2) Below, left, has concentric circles that start at the bottom of the bowl and end about half way up. These concentric circles are not stippled.
- 3) Below, center, has the same unstippled concentric circles but has the addition of vertical ribs starting where the concentric circles end and reaching to the top of the sawtooth rim.
- 4) Below, right, is the same as the third interior pattern, but every other concentric ring is stippled. It may have been that the plunger used to impart the interior pattern was redesigned a couple of times to give the interior more detail.







Apple and Pear Intaglio, Cherry Intaglio, Strawberry Intaglio and Thistle Intaglio - Northwood









The Apple and Pear Intaglio, Cherry Intaglio, Strawberry Intaglio and the Thistle Intaglio patterns each have the design cut into the exterior of the bowl--which is very thick glass. The iridescence is on the outside, not the inside, of these 9 3/4 inch marigold bowls. These were made by Northwood using molds that previously were used to make Goofus Glass where the exterior fruit were painted reds, greens and gold. These molds were rushed into Carnival production when Carnival started to become popular. Production must have been limited as Northwood soon made new molds of new patterns to use in Carnival production.

The Apple and Pear is probably found most often followed by the Strawberry. The Cherry is seldom found and only one of the Thistle Intaglio bowls is known. Small individual berry bowls are also found. These five inch bowls have been found in the Apple and Pear, Cherry and the Strawberry patterns. Below are berry sets for Apple and Pear and for Cherry. No small bowls are known in the Thistle pattern.





SOME very choice pieces are shown here, but like the "Verre D'or" we have to depend on description as it is impossible to show the designs and coloring on plates.


We do not show quite all of the pieces contained in the Assortment as the plate is too small. The glass is the very best fire polished Crystal and the designs graceful and artistic. The large dishes at the top of the plate are very heavy and the design is cut in very deep on the underside, then treated in color and gold effects. The edge of the dishes are fired Bright Gold and we particularly recommend these to your attention, as they are very high class, The 4½ inch Nappies are of the same grade but are made only in the two round shapes. These are made in Strawberry and Apple and Pear Designs. The Apple and Pear Pattern is not shown on the plate, but it is a beauty.

The other pieces are lighter in weight, more delicate and patterned after the expensive Import Goods of this character. The design is Scroll and Poppy, very graceful and artistic. You will be delighted with these goods as they are Holiday Trade Makers and you will duplicate your order more than once. These also are treated with pretty shadings of color on the leaves and flowers, and then the whole design is filled with a Matt Gold Effect. The edges of all the pieces are fired Bright Gold.

This is a photo of a page out of a Fall 1906 Northwood catalog. Possibly the only known Northwood catalog to be found. 1906 is four years after Harry Northwood's start of his factory in Wheeling West Virginia. It is at this factory that Harry would conclude his glass making career as he died in 1919 and the factory in Wheeling closed in 1925. Carnival Glass production did not start at Wheeling until about 1908, so this ad predates the production of carnival glass. The ad does describe the pieces as being "treated in color and gold effects." This would imply Goofus Glass.

Pictured at top center is a large 10 inch bowl in the Strawberry Intaglio pattern. The ad mentions the "Apple and Pear" pattern but notes that it is not pictured in the ad. Most of the items in the ad are the "Scroll and Poppy" pattern which is not found in carnival glass
