We had a great attendance with friends coming from California to Florida... with others coming from other states to support our club along with our faithful Texans! So, thank you for being at our convention.


Our Whitley Award went to Galen and Kathi Johnson who are well deserving of this award.





In Loving Memory

Jon D. Galvin, 83, of Cedar Rapids, passed away April 25, 2023 at St. Luke's Hospital after a long illness.

Jon was born on October 24, 1939 in Marcus, Iowa. His family moved to Cedar Rapids in 1956, where he graduated from Roosevelt High School in 1957 and joined Holy Redeemer. After graduation Jon worked at Woolworth's, where he met his wife, the former Alice Shramek of Swisher. They eloped in 1960 and welcomed four children, Donna Marie, Mary Lynn, Kathy

Ann and Timothy Philip. Over the years, Jon worked for Railroad Express, FMC and Universal Engineering. He retired from Amana Refrigeration/Maytag in 2003. The Galvins lived on 5th Street Northwest in the Time Check neighborhood until 2008, when the family home was lost in the flood. This became a defining moment for Jon. Alongside his neighbors he worked tirelessly to ensure flood survivors could access resources for new homes.

Jon was a man of many passions. In the 1970s he began to collect carnival glass, almost all of which was saved after the flood. He was an expert and beloved member of the Heart of America Carnival Glass Association and several other carnival glass clubs. Nearly every weekend Jon could be found at an auction or watching his great-grandchildren play sports. He was also an avid fisherman, often heading to Lake Mac-Bride or the Iowa River for catfish. He played thousands of hands of canasta with his family and euchre every other Tuesday with his friends at Holy Redeemer. Every Christmas he and Alice hosted extended family for aebleskiver, a tradition passed down from his parents. He loved puzzles and pranks, westerns and woodworking. On Sunday mornings he always turned on Czech Melody for Alice to listen to the polkas. He will be sorely missed by the squirrels who came to the back door in search of a cookie.

He is survived by Alice Galvin, his wife of 63 years; daughters Mary (Robert) Zuroske and Kathy (Daniel) O'Brien; six grandchildren, Angela Boyd (David Ludwig), Timothy Boyd (Kristina), Ann Viall (Nick), Michael O'Brien (Dani), Andrew O'Brien, Matthew O'Brien (Lexi); and 13 great-grandchildren, in whom he delighted: Shayla Hosek, Ellie Hosek, Griffin Boyd, Brody Hosek, Tenley O'Brien, Everett Boyd, Liam Viall, Greyson Viall, Leland O'Brien, Noah Viall, Owen Viall, Lila Ludwig, and Alayna O'Brien.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Walter and Esther Galvin; his siblings Helen, Roger, Philip and Lyle; and his children Donna and Timothy.

Jon brought joy and care to the lives of his loved ones. He found beauty wherever he looked. How lucky we are to have known him.

Cambridge produced carnival glass using the molds from its "Nearcut" line. Nearcut was an attempt by Cambridge to duplicate the look of American brilliant cut crystal glass but to make it much more cheaply. Nearcut, like Nucut from Imperial or Prescut from McKee, obtained the design from a mold and not from glass blanks being cut by trained workers. In 1910, Cambridge issued a catalog for its Nearcut line. Many different patterns were included in the line. Patterns were distinguished with a No. and in some cases by a pattern names. Below are some of Cambridge's Nearcut line items made in carnival glass. Other Nearcut designs not included here are Inverted Feather, Inverted Strawberry and Inverted Thistle.

Forks is the name given to this Cambridge cracker jar. Found in green and marigold with or without a crystal lid. The pattern is essentially the same as Wheat Sheaf but it does have a different mold number: No. 2696. The cracker jar without the lid measures 5 1/4 inches tall, with the lid on it measures 8 1/2 inches tall. It is 9 1/2 inches across (handle to handle). The base is patterned.







The **Hobstar** pattern name and attribution of this green punch bowl and base were described at the 2009 auction where this punch bowl sold. Although this pattern does not appear in the

Cambridge catalog, we include it here due to its similarity of color and design, This is the cup from the pattern and is courtesy of Carl and Eunice Booker. Any Hobstar piece would have to be consid-















"NEARCUT" NOVELTIES.



















The Cambridge catalog page that shows this decanter and tumbler does not reveal a pattern name. While Nearcut refers to a broad line of glass and not a pattern itself, carnival glass collectors have still come to know these pieces as simply the **Nearcut Decanter** or the **Nearcut Tumbler**. The decanter is No.

2666 and stands 12 inches tall with a stopper. Known only in green, they sell very rarely. Creamers, mugs and tumblers (as shown at the left) are of a quite different design. While still being geometric in nature, the pattern covers less of the piece's surface. These tumblers, mugs and creamers are usually found in marigold and many come with souvenir lettering. The Pattern is No. 2658 in the Cambridge catalog as shown.





What little is known about the **Snow-**

flake pattern is from what John Nielsen reported in the February 2009 HOACGA newsletter. He points out that the pattern was found in a book about Cambridge Glass listing 35 shapes in crystal. It was identified as being in the Nearcut line with the pattern No. 2635 Fernland. In a 1940 book, Minnie Kamm named the pattern "Snowflake" for the design near the top and that name seems to have stuck. Only the pitcher shape appears to have been iridized. Few are known and they are all in marigold. The pitcher is 10 inches tall to the top of the spout. Old Cambridge catalogs show the pattern as No. 2635 and in several shapes. It is the toy table set, shown to the left, that has the pattern name Fernland shown.







In carnival glass,

Sweetheart is a
very scarce pattern known only
in this cracker jar
in green and marigold and a marigold tumbler. The
pattern is found in
old Cambridge
catalogs listed as
No. 2361

"Marjorie". Carnival glass collectors
do not use the



name Marjorie but call these pieces Sweatheart for the heart shaped designs between the large hobstars. The pattern is so scarce that the tumbler may be the only one known. Only a handful of cracker jars are thought to exist.





Not many of these spectacular 9-inch stemmed "Venetian" rose-bowls are around. Usually referred to as a rosebowl because they're cupped in, but they could also be considered a vase. Shown in an old Cambridge catalog as the base of an oil lamp. It is listed as No. 2340. The rosebowls are found in green and marigold.

Below to the left, is the only other shape in the pattern. It's a butter dish in marigold. Photo courtesy of Seeck Auctions.








The water set above and the cruets to the left, derive their names from the two types of stars on the trunk of each shape; one large whirling star and a smaller hobstar. Some pieces in this pattern are marked "Nearcut", a Cambridge trade name. Most water sets are green but an occasional marigold or amethyst water set piece turns up now and then. The large cruet is about 5 1/4 inches tall and the small cruet is about 4 inches tall. Both are available only in green and marigold. The stoppers are also iridized.

Although both the water set and the cruets appear in one catalog page from Cambridge, carnival glass collectors refer to the pattern on the cruets as **Buzz Saw** and the pattern on the water set as **Double Star**. Both these patterns appear on this old Cambridge catalog page with the title "No. 2699 Buzz Saw Pattern".





Although commonly referred to as the Cambridge cologne or barber bottle, this piece, left, is part of Cambridge's No. 2660 **Wheat**

Sheaf pattern. It stands 8 1/2 inches tall and is found mostly in green and occasionally in marigold. It is shown in the ad which also includes the Nearcut Decanter on page X. Wheat Sheaf is a pattern of arched vertical hobstar columns. Between or inside these arched columns are sprays of design which resemble wheat sheafs. Depending on the shape of the item, the sheafs can be sprayed upwards or down. The photo below to the far left shows the area between the two arched vertical columns on the decanter and the wheat sheafs are sprayed both up and down. The whiskey decanter, right, is quite rare and is shown in the ad below. It is described as "No. 131 32 oz Decanter Handled".

Public Storage Plate By Corky Cotten

The green plate with a slight stretch effect I found in one of the oddest places. I had driven up and down HWY 6 past Bryan dozens of times and never noticed this building. It is very difficult to spot from the road as it sits up and over a rise. One day I happened to notice the building which was the office for a Public Storage. It also had three smaller signs on the front. One stated Antiques; another stated Embroidery Supplies; and the other Horse Tack. Two trips later I stopped in, and the shop is full of saddles, bridles, hats etc. on one side, mountains of embroidery supplies in the middle and back, and a few pieces of old furniture and crocks on the left. In the only hutch on the bottom shelf was this green Grape and Cable plate. No other glassware was in the shop...just crockery. You never know where you will find a piece, much less at a Public Storage office selling other things.

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
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
