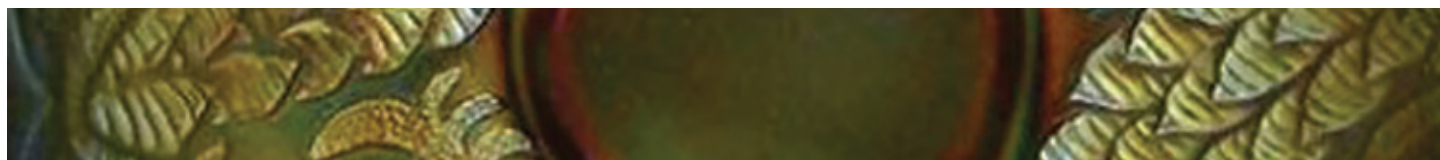

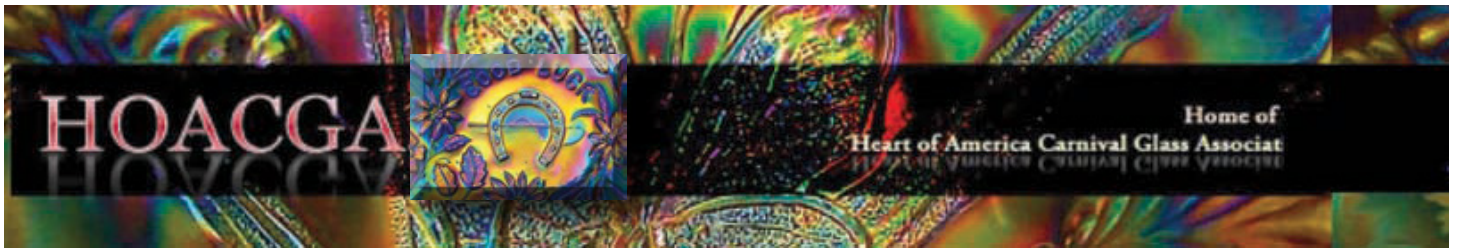

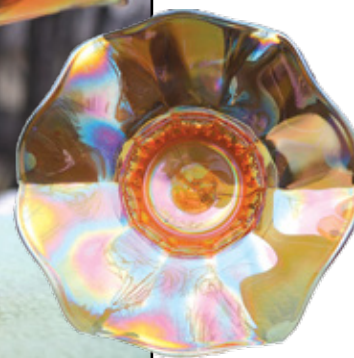
Optic Flute Plain *but* *Pretty*

With much thought and speculation, as to what carnival glass piece to write about. I finally found an item I don't remember seeing written about in the past. This is one of those kind of pieces that does not draw much attention to itself. I like to think of as a plain but pretty piece of carnival.

Made by the Imperial Glass Company, the pattern is known as Optic Flute. It is actually a seldom seen pattern, probably due to being so plain it is overlooked. I have only seen a very few compotes. It also comes in a berry set. In D. Doty's website he has shown a spittoon shaped vase and a variant bowl shape without the flutes. He also shows a stemmed spittoon shaped

compote. I have never seen those shapes before. The compote in my collection, is a basic flared out standard stemmed compote.

It stands at four and one half inches tall. The bowl measures at just over six inches wide. The pattern on the bowl is of course Flute. At the bottom of the bowl section, a one half inch band of a prism effect of triangles and diamond shapes pressed into the glass. Finished off with a fluted stem and round base to stand on.

The main colors found are

marigold and smoke. But with Imperial, I would like to think other colors could be available. Possibly an Imperial purple or clambroth would be spectacular. The compote I have, admittedly I had seen and bypassed several times. Always admired its beauty as it has radium finish.

Purchased it for under \$15.00, for the most part this is a pretty piece that can be purchased cheaply. As pretty as it is, it won't take anything away from your collection. Happy hunting.

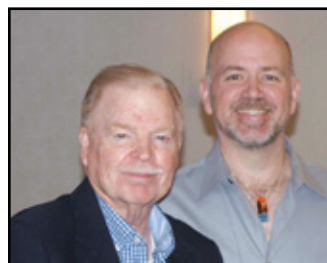

Texas Two-Step at Whitley Award Dinner Leaves the Morgans Speechless

A story of intrigue, deception, and surprise reached its finale at the Whitley Award dinner during the 2015 Texas Carnival Glass Club Convention in Dallas, when Emmett and Dorothy Morgan were given the Whitley Award instead of Tommy and Jeannie Whitley.

#4 The Story: Club officers Carol Curtis, Sandy Sage, and Bob Sage work behind the scenes – and in complete secrecy – to pull off the deception.

In September 2014, Emmett Morgan compiles a list of possible recipients and sends it to the other club officers for additional recipient ideas. Sandy Sage contacts club members Ann and Tom Bumpass to see if they will serve as stand-ins for the award. They willingly agree and Sandy Sage adds their name to the list of possible recipients and sends it back to Carol and Emmett stating that she and Bob think that Tom and Ann should receive the award. Carol Curtis replies to the email in agreement. Sandy Sage lets Tommy and Jeannie

know that Tom and Ann Bumpass are to be the stand-in recipients.

Then things start to fall apart.

Emmett and Dorothy meet with Floyd and Tommy in Houston to discuss the list of possible recipients. Emmett has his own ideas on who should receive the award but Floyd doesn't agree. After much discussion, and with some back and forth squabbling thrown in, Floyd makes an on-the fly decision and says that he wants Tommy and Jeannie to receive the award – end of story.

At the club's December 6, 2014 meeting in Dallas, Emmett announces that Tommy and Jeannie Whitley will receive the Whitley Award at the 2015 convention in March. Tommy and Jeannie Whitley are formally announced as recipients of the award in the January 2015 issue of the *Carnival Glass Action* newsletter.

#5 The Story continues: The plan seems to be working and, with the Morgans still in the dark, Carol Curtis orders a plaque for the Whitley Award with the Morgans listed as the recipients. She gives the person at the award company strict instructions that this is a surprise – to be sure to send the invoice to her – and don't let Emmett know about it.

Guess what happens next? Emmett, of course, receives the invoice for the new plaque and the company has to make up a cover story in a hurry and tell him the invoice was for another company. Carol, needless to say, was furious!

None the wiser, Emmett finalizes the planning for convention's Whitley Award dinner and sends out the

The Bookers teach Carnival



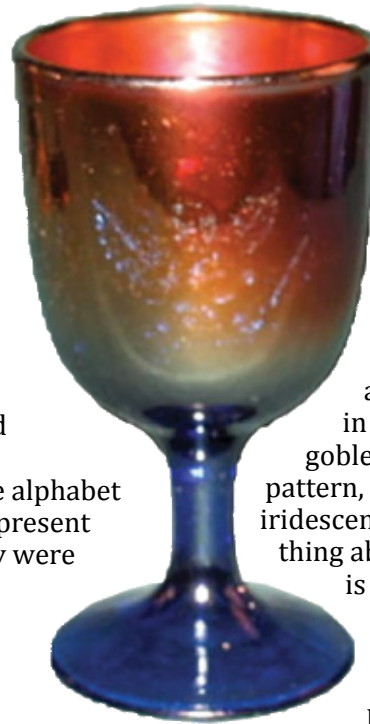

In February of this year I was contacted by a club in our area and asked if I would be willing to give a talk about Carnival Glass. I asked the person about her group and she told me that they were a local chapter of an international organization called Questers. I had never heard of Questers and, after looking it up on the Internet, I found out that Questers are “lovers of antiques, collectibles, and history who encourage an appreciation for antiques and the preservation and restoration of historical landmarks.”

I attended their meeting in early March and was greeted by an enthusiastic group of eight women eager to learn about Carnival Glass.

I took twenty pieces for my talk, including a variety of shapes, patterns, and colors, as well as handouts to help familiarize them with the basics of collecting and what to look for when purchasing pieces.

I was happy to see that they brought pieces for me to identify – all very nice Classic pieces including a green Holly ice cream bowl, a marigold ruffled Vintage bowl, and a peach opal Puzzle bonbon. 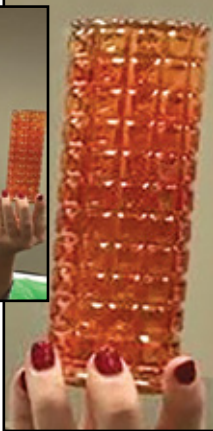

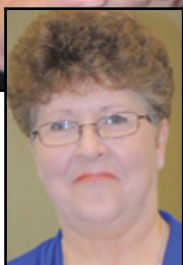

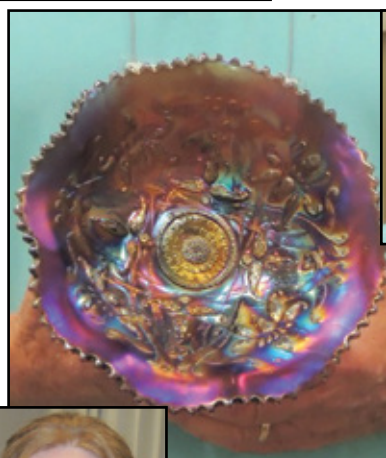

Remembering Ed

Another of our long-time friends and HOACGA members passed away April 14, 2015. Ed Kramer served as secretary of HOACGA for several years and was an active and supportive member since about 1980.

Ed was a one-of-a-kind person. He was always a positive person and never spoke negatively about anyone. He was very generous and willing to help anyone in need. He never met a stranger. Ed liked to take care of the Silent Auction at the HOACGA convention. If an item did not receive any bids Ed would buy the item himself and it would probably show up in the auction next year.

Ed inherited a marigold Four Seventy Four punch set that was his mother's. So being the sentimental person that he was, he added many pieces of Four Seventy Four to go with the set. His Carnival collection consisted mainly of marigold items and candlesticks, but he also collected many other items like the Three Monkeys (see no evil, hear no evil and speak no evil), and there were also a large number of swizzle sticks, mostly with advertisement. There was a 1950 Nash Rambler in his garage. It was similar to the first car that he owned, but it was not driven much, only to the Nash Club meetings.

Ed received his BS degree in Electrical Engineering from the University of Kansas, and his MBA from the University of Missouri Kansas City. He retired at age 50 from the Bendix/Allied Signal Corporation.

He did not travel very far outside of Kansas City by car by himself. We who knew him had a saying, *"If he got over twenty five miles out of town he started to look for a card to send back to his friends."*

We did go to several conventions and auctions together. He would always go to AAA and get a Trip-tic, even though we were only going to St. Louis, a Seeck auction in Mason



City or a Mickey Reichel auction in Boonville, Missouri.

He would watch the roadside mile markers so he would know how much farther it was to our destination. Ed had relatives in Dallas, Texas. He would go to the TCGC convention and would also visit his relatives. On his first trip to Dallas he had a cab driver who took him from the airport to the TCGC convention hotel, and Ed liked him and so he got his telephone number. Every time he went to Texas Ed would call from Kansas City and make arrangements for the cab driver to meet him at the airport and take him to the convention and also to visit his relatives while in Dallas.

There are many fond memories of Edward Kramer, but the one most important is that he was a good and kind man that I had the privilege of knowing for more than 40 years.

I remember their first convention, at the 63rd Street Holiday Inn in Kansas City. Pat brought a large Christmas tree and set it up in their room and decorated it with Carnival Glass pieces. Her theme was a "Carnival Christmas." it was a very impressive display and got much attention. She won the First Place recognition. You could always depend on Pat having a very impressive display.

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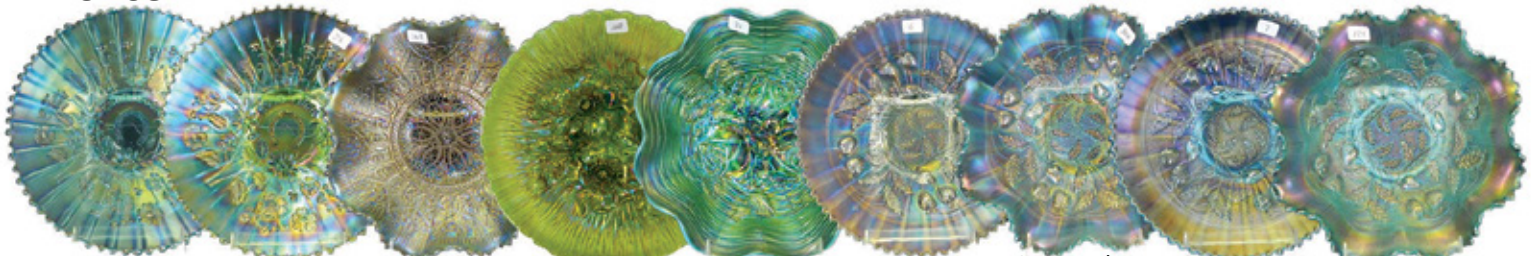
