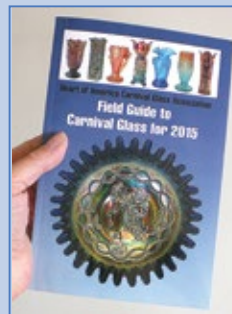

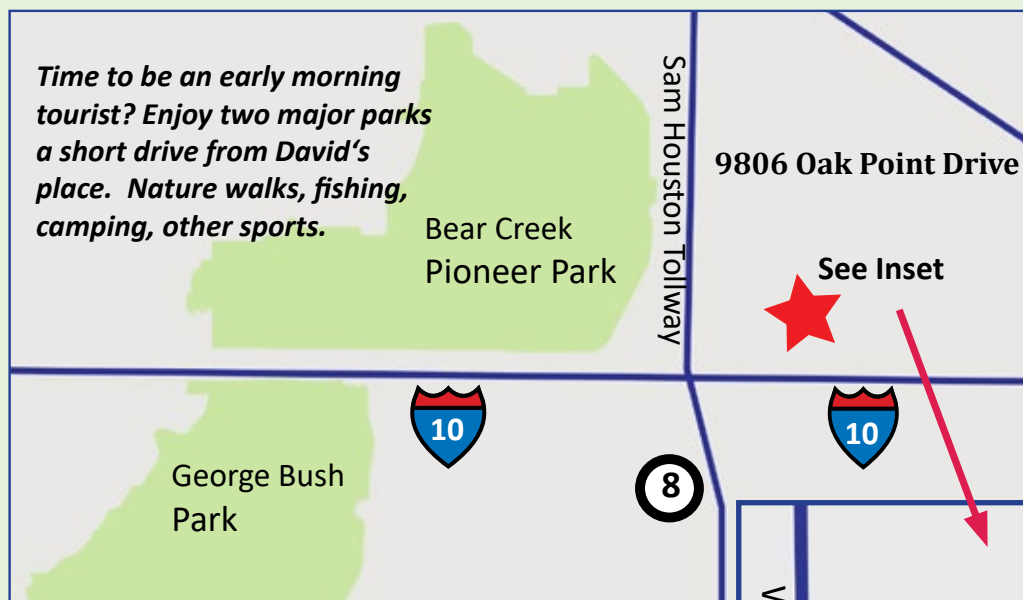
You'll go through the next light at Westview. You'll turn left on the next street which is Oak Point Dr.

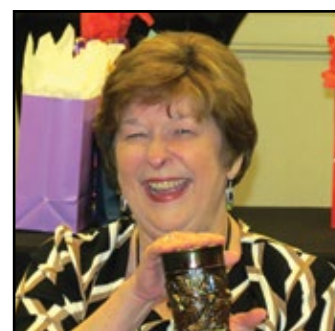
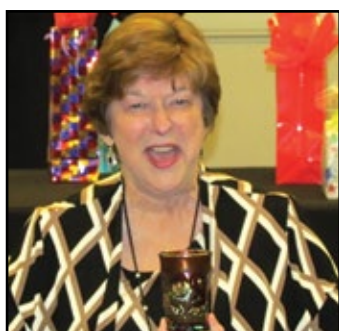

Convention Show and Tell

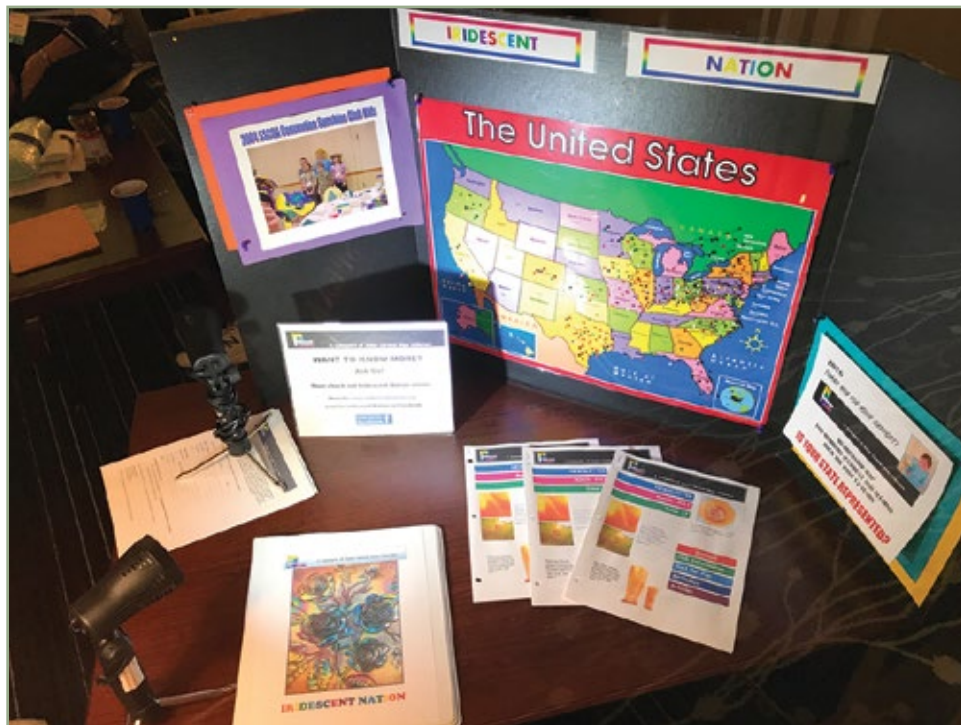

A Unique Odd Couple

Recently, on a whim, during a “get-away day out,” we attended the 38th National Reamer Collectors Association convention as guests. We reasoned where there was glass, we would enjoy! And we did, plus were pleasantly surprised by some similarities to a Carnival Glass convention.

We obviously wore no membership badges, but were immediately greeted and welcomed by several attendees. A short synopsis of the day’s activities was outlined and directions given as to which were displays and who was selling **reamer** wares. We were made to feel a part – much as Carnival Glass conventioners strive to accomplish.

Travelers from near and far came to display and make contact with others who shared their interest in collecting a wide variety of juicers. We specifically spoke with folks from New Jersey, Florida, Illinois, and New York. Again, the carnival glass family came to mind. Lovers of collecting know no boundaries and have an instant connection with each other.

There was a “walk-about” event. All followed the progression of tables of reamers as leaders explained maker (some were familiar), age, etc. This process is reminiscent of TCGC’s “Show and Tell” or perhaps a seminar held for education.

We learned that this kitchen utensil was a bit older than Carnival Glass, having been created more than 200 years ago by Europeans, then traveled across the pond to have the first U.S. reamer be patented in 1867. This travel pattern in reverse can be likened to that of Carnival Glass in the next century.

There is even a Tiffany connection between reamers and carnival glass. One hundred years ago Charles L. Tiffany created a reamer from fine silver. While Tiffany’s iridescent art glass was marketed to the elite who might have possessed a sterling silver reamer, the common housewife was decorating with showy carnival glass and using a less expensive household reamer to juice their fruit.

Categories of reamers include glass, precious metals, figural, and souvenirs to name a few. Carnival Glass makers produced some figural examples as well as souvenir pieces. The Texas organizer of the convention has shared his collection of over 980 reamers through public display in a local museum as well as at the convention. Again, we collectors love to “show off” the results of a lifetime of searching.

As to attending a convention for the first time, we truly identify with a Washington, DC reamer collector who stated, “It was like we had died and gone to heaven!” Carnival Glass and reamers – who knew they had so much in common?

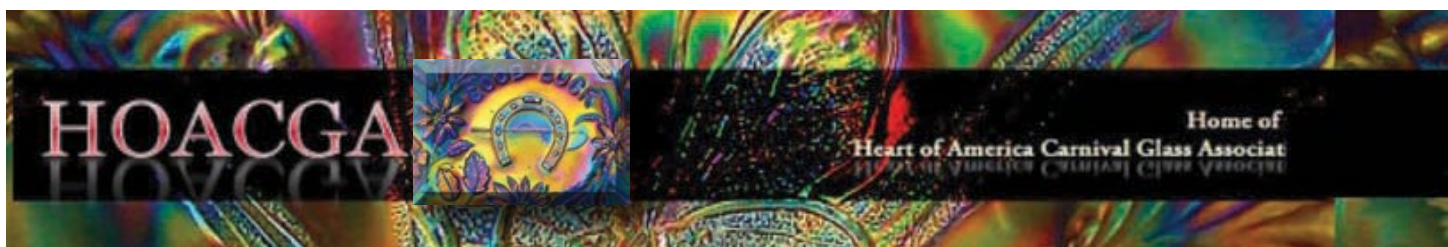
Bernie May

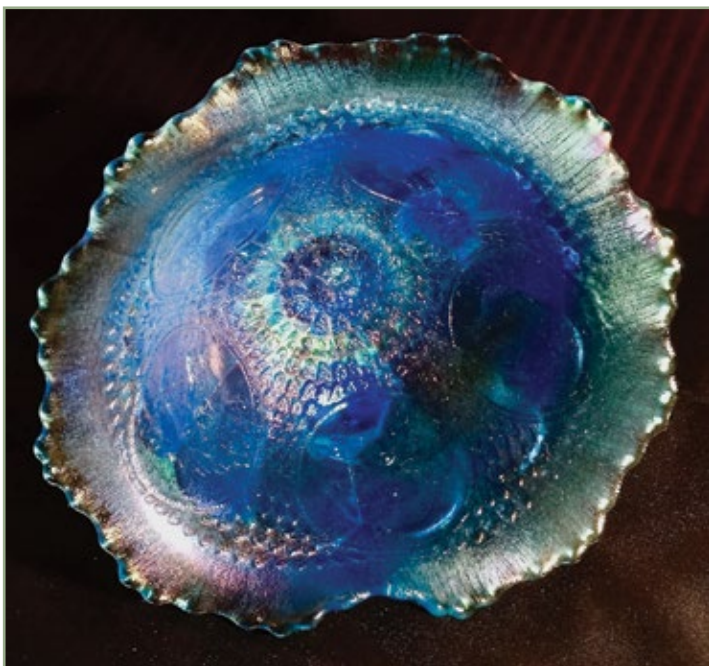

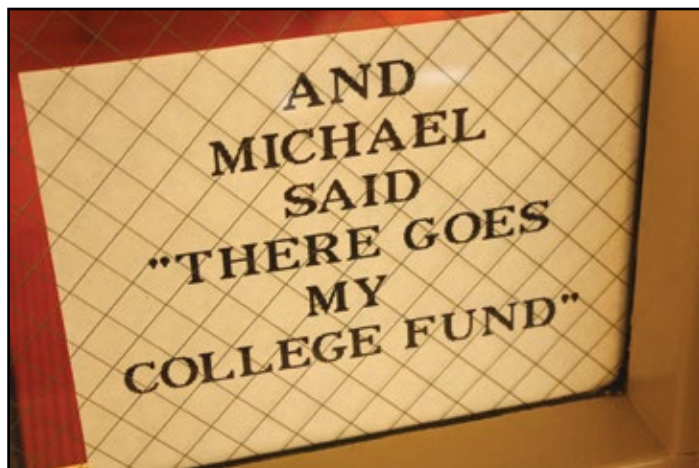
