# **MISSING RARITY**

# Your help is requested to find one-of-a-kind piece

A rare piece of Carnival Glass has been taken from the home of Burney Talley of Albuquerque, New Mexico. The missing piece is the marigold "Goddess of Harvest bowl with the ribbon candy edge (also known tight crimped edge, this is not the 3-in-1 edge bowl). This is the only one known in that color and edge treatment.

A ruffled marigold bowl has been modified, at right, to show how it may look. If you have Dave Doty's "A Field Guide to Carnival Glass, 2015 edition" it is shown on the page just inside the cover. It is also featured in full cover on the cover of the 2008 Field Guide.

These are the circumstances as relayed by Burney. He noticed the piece missing on Saturday, Sept 1, when he returned home after doing some errands. The male housekeeper said he had let a person(s), which he recognized because they had visited with Burney on several other occasions, in the home to wait for Burney to return. The housekeeper went about his cleaning chores in other parts of the house. After he came back into the room the visitors had

left. The housekeeper said he was not aware that the

piece was missing.

This notice has previously appeared in another newsletter, but no reply was received, and I have checked with Burney Talley and he has not received any information about this bowl. Maybe with all of the attention that has been given to Rarities lately, maybe someone may have seen or heard of this piece?

A police report has been filed, but the best chance of finding the missing piece is to let you the collectors know. If you get a knock at your door or a call offering this to you, or someone calls and asks about this piece, or you see it on the internet, get in touch with Burney

# Hunting for the Elusive Blue Ripple Vase



Imperial's Ripple vases are one of those patterns that you can collect and end up with a whole slew of

them. I know because I've seen photo after photo of groups of beautiful Ripple vases in articles and on Facebook. That is not the case in our home where we have just five Ripple vases: two purple, one amber, one marigold (funeral) and our latest acquisition, in cobalt blue.

The Hooked on Carnival website (also David Doty's website) states that blue is quite hard to find with only a couple of examples in cobalt, though quite a few in lighter blue. In an article for the Iridescent Nation club's newsletter Joan Doty wrote, "Some Ripples seem to have been made from very sharp

molds, with clear sharp 'ripples,' while on others the 'ripples' seem

to disappear." Our cobalt blue vase looks like it falls into the latter category. It is 10.5 inches tall with a 2 7/8-inch diameter base with soft rippling waves that do seem to disappear.

Truth be told I had never seen a blue Ripple vase in person, but one year at a HOACGA convention Gary Lickver mentioned that he had one in his collection. The carnival glass bug bit me then and there, and I was on the hunt. Gary was never willing to let his go, but this year we noticed that the ICGA convention had one in its auction of the Nancy and late Bernie May Collection. Bob and I were the lucky winners of that cobalt blue Ripple vase and we love it.



The 2019 HOACGA Convention will be April 24–28, 2019, at the Embassy Suites Hotel (Kansas City Airport). Reservations may be made by calling the hotel at 816-891-7788. Room rate is \$124.00 (two people), \$134.00 (three people) or (\$144.00(four people). All rooms are two-room suites. Breakfast and Managers Reception (happy hour) are included in room rate. (All rooms are on 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, or 4<sup>th</sup> floors.)

Room Displays: Room Displays are one of the traditional aspects of Carnival Glass conventions. They are a vital and educational part of the convention. You are encouraged to bring a room display for all of those in attendance to view and appreciate. Each Room Display will receive a Mary Ann Vase (Contemporary) by Mosser Glass. Displays winning each of the categories below will win a monetary award of \$50.00. The Display judged Best Overall and the Peoples Choice (judged by attendees) will each receive a \$150.00 award. Only one award per display. The display categories are:

First time having a display at HOACGA Best Contemporary display Best combined Contemporary and Classic display. Same Maker Same Color Same Pattern Same Shape

**Display Room:** The 2019 Special Display will be Northwood Blue - the darker colors: cobalt, blue, Renninger and sapphire. This will be an opportunity to compare the various darker blues. There are at least 20 different variations of blue (ice blue, agua opal, Persian blue, etc) pieces. We cannot, because of space limitations, display all of the various blue variations. We did the lighter blues several years ago. The display will be set up on Thursday morning and will be available for viewing from Thursday afternoon until Friday afternoon at 4:00 p.m. Presentation of the Special Display will be by Tom Mordini on Friday morning. Tom has seen, handled, and compared more pieces of Carnival Glass than probably any other collector. So select your Northwood blue pieces of cobalt, blue, sapphire, and Renninger, including opal examples of any of these colors, that you would share. Then send the list: pattern, shape, color, back or secondary pattern, plus any aspect of the piece, or pattern, you feel is interesting or important, to Bob Grissom, bgrsm31@comcast.com) or 7517 Evanston St, Raytown, MO 64138.



Contemporary Auction: New for 2019, the auction will be an on-line AND live auction on Thursday evening. Seeck Auctions will conduct the auction of about 100 pieces of Contemporary Carnival Glass from the late Dolores Sage collection. The glass will be posted on the Seeck Auctions website as a regular on-line auction. Attendees of the live auction on Thursday evening may view and inspect the glass starting at 4:00 pm and bid on-line during the auction.

Award Luncheon: The John and Lucile Britt Award has been given to a HOACGA member since 1993. It is being replaced by a Special Recognition Award, which will be given to a Carnival Glass Collector who has demonstrated their dedication and service to Carnival Glass. Eleanor Mochel and Ann McMorris will be the first recipients of this award. Eleanor served as the Bulletin Secretary for about 20 years. She wrote many of the articles and had the Newsletter, printed, addressed, postage stamp affixed, and took it to the Post Office for mailing. Ann McMorris as Secretary, maintained the records of the organization for 20 or more years. Ann was also active in the functioning of ICGA.

Annual Meeting – Friday 2:00 p.m.: Each year three of the six officers of HOACGA are subject for election or re-election. This year the President, Secretary and Research & Historical Editor are to be elected or re-elected. **October –** Charles Mochel reported that Bruce Hill had found a blue Tornado vase with interior ribbing.

Richard & Carol Cinclair, Plano, Texas reported finding a lime green opal Boggy Bayou and a Diamond & Oval Thumbprint vase. They are both very rare but the Diamond & Oval Thumbprint is the most rare.

Mary Hanenkrat, Waynesfield, Ohio reported the organization of a new Carnival Glass club. On September 11, 1988, twenty-one collectors met at the home of Henry & Beverly Hawk to form the Western Buckeye club. The club will meet four times a year.




# **Lloyd R Ward**

# Footed Fine Rib Vase

noted they seemed to be the same pattern, but different. From what I have read, they are Footed Fine Rib vases, although some have been known to be called Jack In The Pulpit vases because of their shape. They come in JIP shape and ruffled shape.

The vases are primarily made by Northwood and Fenton. Both are footed vases. The pattern on the interior is smooth or plain. The exterior is a Fine Rib pattern. On the Northwood vase, the cylinder part is straight to flared at the top, where it is stretched into JIP or ruffled shape. The ribs stop at the bowl section. The top of the bowl section has stretched points or teeth.

Fenton also made a version that just above the foot is a rounded band the cylinder shape comes out of. The ribs continue to within three eights inch of the top of the ruffled or JIP bowl section. That bowl section has smooth edges all the way around, not points or teeth.

Colors come in marigold, amethyst, green aqua Opal, and white in Northwood. The Fenton version also come in the same colors, with powder blue and a standard blue. I don't think it would be cobalt blue, as is lighter color blue than cobalt, but darker than powder blue with marigold overspray. A Vaseline was reported.

As best as I can tell, my green Jack in the Pulpit vase looks to have a N with a line under it, down inside of the vase. I just recently found the blue, ruffled Fenton vase. I thought this might show a comparison of two different makers with basically the same pattern.

The main part of the vase stands at about five and one quarter inches high. The back point on the JIP, made it 7 inches tall in back. The footed base is at two and seven eights inches diameter. The Fenton bowl section is five and three eights inches across, while the Northwood version is four and seven eights inches across. Most of these vases are not expensive, but they are a nice addition to your collection.







Both patterns use clear glass with a marigold overlay that allows the cut flowers to contrast like frost against the orange background. Instead of simply shearing off each petal, the cuts are finally grooved and include splashes of untouched glass for emphasis.

Each vase is about 10 inches high, and about a four-inch diameter. The iridized glazing is simple but allows for a play of pinks, blues and yellows across its impressed designs.

Finally, the curve of flower stems and leaves up each face, and the shallow posy-style cut to the flowers are similar.

Where the patterns differ is in the vertical shapes and arrangements of cane work. Cut Flowers is a simple cylinder with alternating vines and flower stems surrounding it. The top is a band of cane and diamonds that gives this casual piece a touch of formality.

Cane and Daisy Cut is the more formal of the two due to its octagonal shape and structured pattern. Four broader faces show a bending stem of leaves and two cut blossoms. The narrower four faces provide columns of woven cane to frame the flowers. Even geometric, the designer added interest to the canes by cross-hatching the octagon "open" spaces of the weaving while the cane parts are also broken into five parts. With so much happening, the minerals glazing the glass have a lot of places to pool up into a rainbow of colors.

In its day U.S. Glass, the vases maker, was an octopus of a corporation. Seventeen glassmakers merged into one company in 1891, according to a story in The Antiquarian, an online resource. The aim was to provide more ways to save money and leverage better prices, both in the costs to make glass and stabilize profit. Each of the 17 factories were given an alphabet designation with the Tiffin, Ohio,

plant, or Plant R, the likely maker of the vases. It's where the finer handwork pieces were produced while the other plants supplied window glass, bottles, etc.

One reason why the Tiffin plant, and other Ohio glassmakers, rose to prominence, was the discovery of natural gas pockets in the state. Tapping gas resources to fuel the glass furnaces was cheaper than coal which was more labor intensive and costly to mine.

Eventually the U.S. Glass factories closed until the Tiffin plant and one other remained. It went bankrupt in 1963 and reorganized under another company.
